

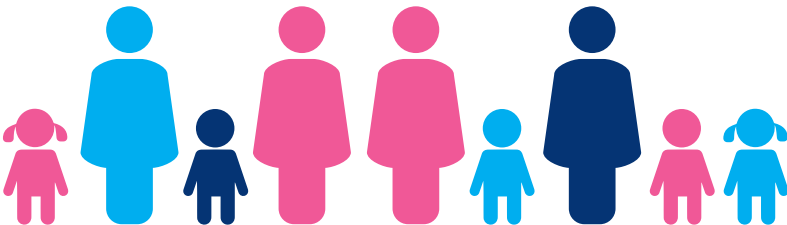


Ending domestic abuse

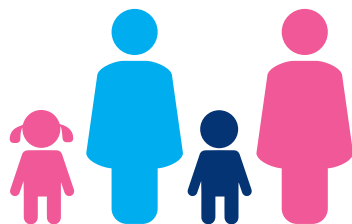
